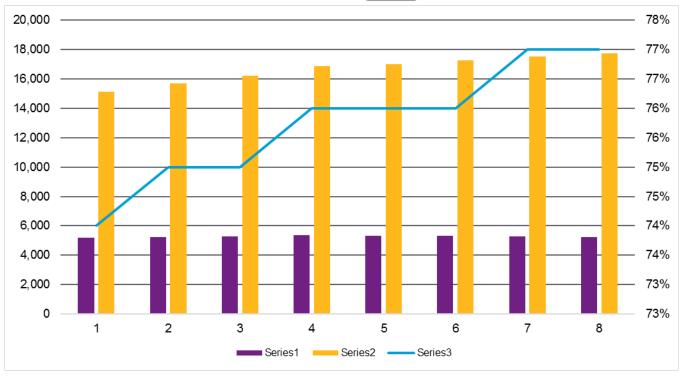

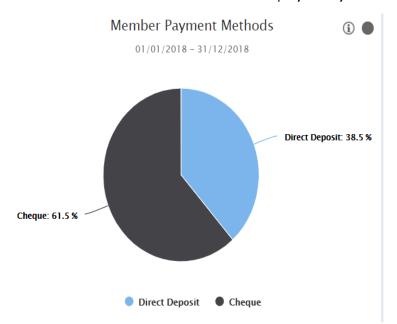

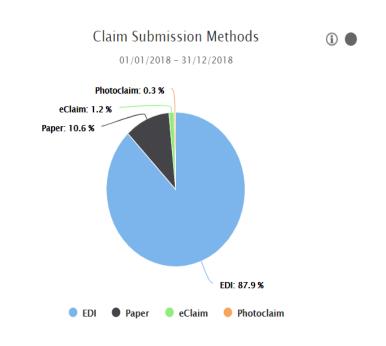
- Globally, the percentage of retirees below age 65 has decreased significantly in the past few years in all provinces (41.1% of members were below age 65 in 2012)

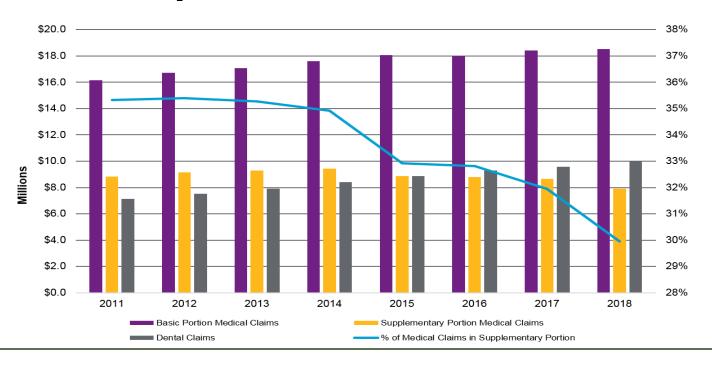

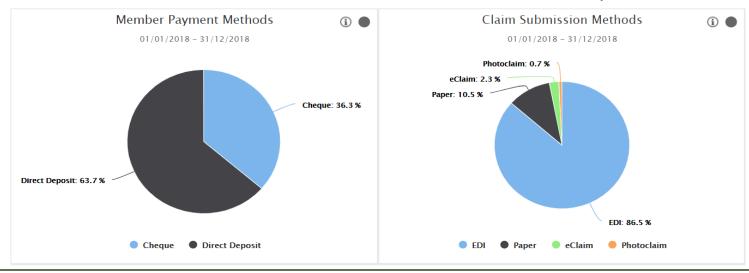

Voluntary Supplementary Health Plan

- Total Paid Claims in 2018 = 36,453,000
 - Medical claims decreased by 8.4% and dental claims increased by 4.5% compared to 2017. Combined claims have decreased by 1.6%
 - Dental claims have increased between 3% and 6% annually since 2012

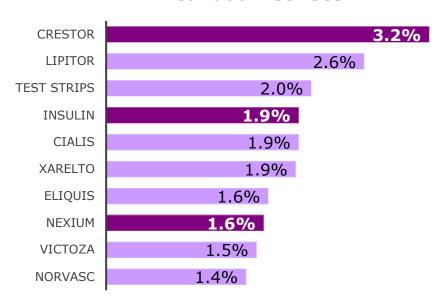

Post-Retirement Buy-Out (PRB)

- In 2018 Air Canada offered a post-retirement benefits (PRB) to approximately 23,000 retirees allowing a
 one time opportunity to opt out of the Retiree Group Health and/or Life coverage
- 589 retirees accepted the health care offer
 - Of these 589 retirees, 259 were enrolled in the VSHP
 - Of these 259 retirees, 81 chose to maintain their dental benefits
- Retirees under the VSHP who elected the Health Buyout Offer had the choice to keep their dental coverage at their own cost
 - 81 retirees elected to keep their dental coverage and a monthly cost of:

Coverage	Monthly Premium Rate
Single	\$29.40
2 persons	\$58.81
3 or more	\$73.51



Health Spending Account (HSA) & Wellness Account

HSA

 Use it to pay for all medical dental expenses that are eligible under Canada Revenue Agency rules;

Wellness

 Use it to pay for gym memberships, sports league memberships, purchase of sports equipment, etc...

Current Coverage	Exchange Offer for Retirees
Health Care	Annual deposit into an HSA/Wellness account of \$450 for single coverage and \$900 for family coverage for the lifetime of the retiree (transferable to the spouse upon the death of the retiree)
Life Insurance	Single cash payment (based on age)

Scenario 1 - Maximum reimbursement of \$225/24 months for glasses and \$125/24 months for exams	\$2,593,000	Single: \$ 7.81 2 persons or more: \$ 15.62	
Scenario 2 - Maximum reimbursement of 325/24 months for glasses and \$125/24 months for exams	\$3,285,000	Single: \$ 9.90 2 persons or more: \$ 19.80	



Vision analysis

Scenario 1 – additional yearly cost

Single coverage \$93.72

2 persons or more \$187.44

Scenario 2 – additional yearly cost

• Single coverage \$118.80

• 2 persons or more \$237.60

Costs in the first year could be higher than estimated as many retirees will choose to benefit from the coverage in the first 12 month period
